Founders Day shopping & fun April 27

Jazz and Gospel music concerts in the municipal park start Wesson's Founders Day celebration on Friday evening, April 27, with Mississippi Country Music legend Jeff Bates, fireworks and street dancing capping the fun and festivities the next night in the downtown area.

Upwards of 1,000 persons are expected for the array of events, which also include the annual parade, a flea market, a hot dog eating contest, and other musical performances.

The Co-Lin Jazz Band will set the mood for the festive occasion at 6 p.m. on Friday, followed by a Zion's Way Southern Gospel Quartet performance at 7 p.m. The kickoff concerts will be the only events outside the immediate downtown area on Highway 51 and Spring and Factory Streets.

Bates, the Saturday evening headliner, will bring to the Wesson stage both secular Country & Western musical entertainment and witness to his recovery and redemption following a life of drugs and alcohol that landed him in jail in the late 1990s. "I share the trials and tribulations to drug addiction, going to jail, finding Jesus in jail, and what He's done in my life," says Bates. "I am now clean and sober." In 2011, he won the Inspirational Country Music (ICM) Faith, Family & Country Awards title for

Mainstream Country Artist. "Me and Conway" was one of his major secular projects, including original tunes and six Conway Twitty classics, one of which is a duet with Loretta Lynn. His albums also include "Rainbow Man" and "Leave the Light On" recorded by RCA and "One Day Closer" on Black River Entertainment.

Officials review WAC security

Wesson Police are prepared to provide a full-time armed officer for service at Wesson Attendance Center (WAC) during school hours, pending authorization of the Copiah County School Board, Chad O'Quinn, Chief of the Department, told a meeting of school officials, municipal police and fire department personnel and parents concerned about safety at WAC.

O'Quinn made the offer at the meeting he set up following an incident at the school, which prompted a number of parents to express their concerns about safety issues at WAC. The incident, which occurred less than a week after the shootings at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, involved a student who allegedly threatened a teacher. Wesson Police readily responded and referred the student to Copiah County Youth Court, charged with simple assault and intent to create fear.

Only a handful of parents came to the question-and-answer session at the Old School Community Center, with local school, police and fire officials predominantly present to address questions submitted in advance.

WAC Principal Marilyn Phillips reported that the school has instituted new security policies, with classrooms locked during teaching hours and all entrances locked after 8 a.m., except the one to the high school, where an unarmed school resource officer is

located. She also highlighted WAC's protocols related to duty and visitor rosters, traffic plans, evacuation procedures and weather response; a hazardous waste policy due to the school's proximity to the railroad and camera monitoring throughout the facility. Although the school resource officer is unarmed due to training requirements, he has access to a firearm on campus, Phillips said. Details on security practices, policies and procedures are published in student manuals available on the WAC section of the Copiah County Schools website (https://www.copiah. ms), she pointed out.

Recognizing immediate that concerns following the incident largely stemmed from lack of information, Phillips also conceded, "I do see there's a need to better inform parents, and we're going to do a better job of putting that out there."

Although word started spreading after the incident that "something happened," WAC made no statement or sent a letter to homes of students,

and the Wesson Police issued only a brief report about the incident on its social media account three days later.

"At first I was angry I had not been notified -- that I had to find out through Facebook," one parent said at the meeting. The mother of a sixyear-old kindergartener said "that's my child, and I should have been the one to make the decision on whether to send her to school those couple of days after."

Phillips and police officials cited privacy laws in partially defending the somewhat muted initial response following the incident.

"We had a disciplinary action at our school, and we can't share that information," Phillips noted. On the other hand, O'Quinn reassured the audience that his force is prepared to respond to incidents. Whether or not they are stationed at WAC, "if there was a shooting at the school, we're going to go to where the threat is,' he said. "We're not going to stand outside."



Conquering stress in your life

Stressors come in many forms, and even positive life events can increase our stress levels. In fact, stress in the U.S. has increased 30% over the last three decades.

At moderate levels, stress can motivate us to reach our goals and keep life interesting. However, when stressors are severe or chronic, our bodies may not be able to adapt. Stress can compromise immune functioning, leading to a host of diseases of adaptation. In fact, stress has been linked to between 50 and 70 percent of all illnesses. Further, stress is associated with negative health behaviors, such as alcohol and other drug use, and to psychological problems, such as depression and anxiety.

There are at least three different types of stress:

- Eustress, good or routine stress related to the pressures of work, family, and other daily responsibilities;
- · Distress, bad stress caused by a sudden negative change, such as

losing a job, divorce, or illness;

• Traumatic stress, experienced when threatened with being seriously hurt or killed, such as in a major

accident, war, assault or a natural disaster. This type of stress can cause post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

The body responds to stress in a variety of ways:

- **Physiologically** (Body): elevated heart rate, palms get sweaty, muscles get tense.
- · Cognitive (Mind): worry, lack of concentration, forgetfulness.
- Emotional: anger, hot-tempered reaction, panic, a sense of dread.
- · Behavioral: impatience, hurrying, feeling high strung.

Common external causes of stress include, but are not limited to major life changes, work or school, relationship difficulties, financial problems, being too busy, and children and family. Common internal causes of stress include, but are not limited to chronic worry, pessimism, rigid thinking, lack of flexibility, negative self-talk, unrealistic expectations/perfectionism and an all-or-nothing attitude.

Physical symptoms experienced as a result of stress are fatigue (51 percent of the time), headache (41 percent), upset stomach (34 percent), muscle tension (30 percent), change in appetite (23 per cent), teeth grinding (17 percent), change in sex drive (15 percent) and feeling dizzy

(13 percent).

Chronic stress effects, according to helpguide.org, can lead to depression and anxiety, weight problems,

weight problems, a u t o i m m u n e diseases, skin c o n d i t i o n s, reproductive issues, pain, heart disease, digestive problems, sleep problems, cognitive and memory problems,

and much more.

Stress management encompasses physical activity, sleep, journaling, listening to music, breathing exercises, guided imagery and time management.

Time management is particularly effective in adapting to the stresses of modern living. For example, managing time is critical to academic success as well as overall well-being. In one study of college students, higher

levels of perceived control over time were associated with lower levels of stress and higher levels of academic performance, problem-solving ability, and health. In another study, performance, better time management was more helpful against academic stress than leisure activities. Time management involves knowing how to spend your time, setting goals and deadlines, prioritizing, writing what you need to do, scheduling both recreational activities and your responsibilities, avoiding procrastination, assessing your effectiveness at managing time and improving it.

In a letter, Mississippi Attorney General Jim Hood has put Facebook on notice to preserve any relevant paper and electronic documents for an investigation into whether the social media giant violated the Mississippi Consumer Protection Act when it gave permission to University of Cambridge Professor Aleksandr Kogan to harvest information of users who downloaded his app, "thisisyourdigitallife." information included user locations, friends and activity on the social media platform. Hood also joined a bipartisan coalition with thirty-six other state attorneys general in sending a separate letter to Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg that raised questions about the social networking site's policies and practices. Hood reminded Mississippians to check the security settings on their social media accounts, paying close attention to any area that offers options for sharing data with applications connected to that social media platform. 

Sugarcane processing a dying art

Mark Stevens discussed the dying art of sugar cane syrup processing at a Wesson Lions Club meeting. Stevens, who maintains the art on his Columbia, Mississippi, farm, plants seven to eight acres of new sugar cane in rows during the early fall from cut tops of the growing cane. He harvests stalks of cane in November or December, mills them to squeeze out juice and slowly cooks the juice three to four hours on a fire-wood furnace. From eighty gallons of juice, he makes forty to fifty quarts of syrup. As the juice is cooked, water and impurities come out. If the juice is over-cooked, Stevens warns, it turns back to sugar. On the other hand, it will expand and explode in the jars in which it is stored if it is under-cooked. Stevens produces about 3,000 quarts of sugar cane syrup each year.



A Wesson student was one of two in the Literary Arts department at The Mississippi School of the Arts (MSA) to receive national awards through the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards.

Shelly Castilaw of Wesson and Christopher Aaron of Bogue Chitto were also among among Gold Key winners at the Mississippi Regional Competition hosted by The Eudora Welty House, in conjunction with the Eudora Welty Foundation. At the national level, they competed with thousands of other students from every state in the nation.

Shelly Castilaw, an MSA senior, received a Gold Medal in Poetry and a Silver Medal with Distinction for her Writing Portfolio, while Aaron, also a senior at MSA, received a Silver Medal for a short story. Students in the national competition had been identified by panels of creative professionals as the most talented young artists and writers in the nation and the award recipients will be honored at a ceremony at

Hyde-Smith goes to U.S. Senate

A Co-Lin graduate from Brookhaven has become Mississippi's first woman and first Southwestern Mississippi native to serve in the U.S. Senate.

Before a crowd of local citizens and state officials in Brookhaven, Mississippi Governor Phil Bryant announced the appointment of Cindy Hyde-Smith, the State Agriculture and Commerce Commissioner, to fill the seat of retiring U.S. Senator Thad Cochran from April 1 until voters select his replacement in a special November election.

"This decision is all mine," said the Governor, who reportedly also considered Lieutenant Governor Tate Reeves and Secretary of State Delbert Hoseman for the appointment.

With her husband Michael and daughter Anna-Michael, Hyde-Smith told the cheering crowd "I'm honored the Governor chose me when he had a great list of qualified candidates." In her brief remarks, she also confronted an issue that is likely to loom large in her campaign for the November special election -- namely, her history as a Democrat before moving over to the Republican Party with many other Mississippi elected officials in 2010.

"I've been a conservative all my life," she proclaimed. As a Democrat, who served Mississippi Senate District 39, which encompasses Lawrence and Lincoln and parts of Copiah and Walthall counties, for three terms beginning in 2000, Hyde-Smith said she left behind a "long paper trail" that documents "a record of conservatism, a record of accomplishments and getting

things done." She also cited a list of Republican causes she supports -rebuilding the military, border security, repealing Obamacare and protecting Second Amendment rights; praised the Trump Administration for slashing government regulations, repeated President Trump's "make America great again battle cry" and reminded

her audience that she advised President Trump on agricultural issues during his run for the White House.

Wesson Mayor Alton Show, who was on hand to celebrate the appointment of the new Senator, said it was good to have someone in the state's Congressional delegation who knows southwest Mississippi.

"Our Congressional delegation has always been responsive and listened to our needs," Shaw said. "But it's a bonus to have someone who personally understands your interests and concerns because they are part of your area."

Currently, State Senator Chris McDaniel, a conservative associated with the Tea Party wing of the Mississippi Republican Party, and Democrats Mike Espy, who served as a Mississippi U.S. Representative and President Bill Clinton's Secretary of Agriculture, and Tupelo Mayor Jason Shelton will be on the November special election ballot with Hyde-Smith. A Chism Strategies poll recently showed Espy leading in the race. McDaniel's campaign and around hundred countylevel Republican leaders across the state have called on President Trump to withhold support for Hyde-Smith.

Mississippi voters first elected the Lincoln County cattle farmer State Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce in 2011 -- a role in which she was instrumental in getting China to lift its ban on importing American beef and persuading U.S. authorities to set standards for imported catfish, she pointed out

"I pledge to you to serve all our citizens with dignity, honor and respect," Hyde-Smith said. "I look forward to serving in the U.S. Senate with Senator Roger Wicker and Mississippi's Congressional delegation. You can get many things done in Washington, DC, for Mississippi and I look forward to working side by side with them to truly make our state a better place."

Phyllis Jordan may reside in Dentville. Mississippi, outside Hazlehurst, but Wesson is her home, if that is the place where you can find special people who love and care for you.

"People I didn't know would walk up to me and put a hundred dollar bill in my hand," Jordan recalls. A church raised \$500 to assist her. "The people of Wesson are unlike people I know anywhere else in their generosity," Jordan says. "They opened their hearts and pocketbooks. I couldn't be more grateful."



Attracted by Wesson Attendance Center, Jordan and her husband came to Wesson in 1988 to rear their three children -- Crissy, now 35; Sasha, now 30, who works at the Dollar Store; and Zachery, now 25, and a licensed preacher, who aspires to studying for the ministry. They all attended Wesson Attendance Center, starting





Unique barn nurtures artists

Nearly every Thursday morning, just to the south of Wesson off Highway 51 in an old barn, you can find a dedicated group of artists sitting at their easels or work stations, doing what they love. Painting.

Tucked away in a serene setting off Newman Trail is the Art Barn, built to give artists a space to work and young students a setting to learn - a unique place that nurtures artists in different ways.

Ava Jane Newell's husband Mark built it in 2000 to give her a place to teach. He used materials mostly scrounged, borrowed or donated.

"Windows, doors came from old barns and houses," Newell told me on a recent visit to this magical place.

On the floor are sporadic paint spills along with some pretty clever designs. "Students painted their names all over the floor, and whatever else they thought of," Newell says. While Newell no longer teaches, she has opened up the barn to artists to use as a work space. "From ten until two every Thursday, we gather to paint and have fun. Of course, food and coffee are also involved."

The idea of the Brookhaven Regional Arts Guild (BRAG), which has become a growing influence in the arts in our area, came out of the Art Barn. BRAG sponsors several art showings throughout the year, including an annual show in which it awards ribbons to the best in several media and an overall best work.

I came to the Art Barn to learn more about a project Newell and fellow artist Maxine Minter undertook during January -- to paint constantly every day and complete as many works as possible during the month.

"I was able to complete twelve paintings," Minter, 92, said.

"It takes over your whole life. My sun room is filled with paintings." Newell added: "The painting never stops. I took my water colors with me when I visited Texas during the month." Newell pursued the challenge previously, but this was the first time for Minter. "Painting keeps you sharp," Newell said as the explanation for the



project. "You don't just pick up your brushes and start painting. It takes a lot of preparation." Since January, four of Minter's marathon painting month works have been selected for post cards to promote her home town of Savanna, Tennessee.

But the Art Barn is more than mara-

a venue for perfecting technique and a place to find unique ways to express their deepest feelings and emotions. While I looked around at all the works hanging on every inch of the walls, I stood behind Bettie Bullard, fascinated by her technique -- applying just a dab of paint to her canvass, and then with a cloth manipulating the color just the way she wanted it. I also watched Sharon Allen working on a project near to her heart. After her young adult daughter died, she chose a unique way to memorialize her: decorative boxes for storing books.

"She was a reader," Allen says. "So I'm building these boxes for books. People can take a book and read it and return it." She was working on her third box. The first one is at her house, while the second one is at Dr. Sessums pediatric dentist office.

I confess that I once took an art class to meet a girl. I learned how to draw a box and a corner -- and I got a date. The Art Barn proves there is more to be had!

That's it this month, friends. Plays are running, music is being played and festivals and outdoor concerts are just around the corner. Go out and support the arts!

Newman Memorial Fields on Grove Street the center of community activity, with more than a 1,000 strong on hand -- boys and girls who play, their parents and grandparents, who volunteer as WAF coaches, concession stand staff, maintenance workers and officers, and fans, who enjoy the games and social life at the ball park.

WAF fields Tee Ball teams for boys and girls aged four, five and six years old; coach-pitch softball teams for children seven and eight years old, softball teams for

girls nine, ten, eleven and twelve years old; and baseball teams for boys nine, ten, eleven and twelve years old. The games are played on four different fields -- each one laid out to accommodate

the ages and genders of the players. In Tee Ball, batters hit a ball placed on an adjustable tee atop home plate and players learn other game skills. Coachpitch baseball or softball (sometimes called Buddy Ball) is the next step for children in which the team coaches pitch to batters on the opposing team, with the intent of allowing them to hit the ball or put it into play. Finally, the girls and boys move on to softball and baseball.

The season for the varied WAF teams will feature twelve to sixteen games. In softball and baseball competition, teams from the Copiah County Baseball Association also play their WAF counterparts. At the end of season, WAF chooses All Star Teams with the outstanding performers in coach-pitch, and regular softball and baseball. The softball and baseball All Star teams compete with similar All Star teams from throughout the state and region

in post-season tournament play organized by the U.S. Specialty Sports Association (USSA). In 2012, WAF's baseball All Stars of eleven and twelve year old boys

competed for the state championship.

WAF's origins trace to the 1970s, when Co-Lin started baseball and softball programs that involved some

30 to 40 children. By the 1990s, a loose organization of volunteers was spearheading expanding programs with some 90 to 100 participants. With land donations that allowed them to develop new ball fields, the need for additional acreage to serve growing numbers of children, and a concessions business that was generating increasing funds, volunteers, who guided the program, decided to incorporate as the Wesson Athletic Foundation in 2006 in a formalized structure with a board, bylaws, and stricter financial management. By 2009, WAF had purchased five acres of the Hiram Newman land and received donated land for its Buddy Ball field and a parking lot.

Although WAF Today draws its participants primarily from the Wesson area, children from Bogue Chitto, Bude, Crystal Springs, Hazlehurst, Meadville and Monticello are also involved in it program. It operates as a memberowned organization. The members are the parents or grandparents, who pay fees for their children to play on WAF teams (currently \$65 for one child and \$50 for each additional child three years old to six years old and \$75 for one child and \$60 for each additional child seven years old to twelve years old). Beyond the fees, which cover uniforms and season-end trophies and medallions for

players, WAF generates revenues for maintenance and improvements, lights, utilities, and umpires from concession sales, thirty-two team sponsors (\$300 each) and six scoreboard sponsors (\$1000 each).

"Our strength is that we are an organization owned by member volunteers who will do anything to benefit the children we serve," says WAF board member Brett Selman. "Organizations that provide similar services are most often departments of parks and recreation operated government, which do not have the kind of stakeholders we have -- parents and grandparents concerned about the quality and value of our program."

A former board member adds: "Coaches, the volunteers who maintain the playing fields, concession stand workers and the organization's officers bond as they work together. I made some of my best friends through service with the Wesson Athletic Foundation. Even when the work was done, we would hang around the ball fields and talk with each other."

In addition to Selman, WAF's current board members are Cody Burns, Travis Coleman, Clay Earl, Jake Martin, Travis Smith, Scotty Thaxton and Todd Warren.
